


Growing Up with Extermination

No! Being Acrobatic Pilot Was More Fun



- This is not Věra flying. She flew before I was born.
- There are no pictures, just stories.
- Scary stories!
- So that I could be born, Věra had to get married first.
- She had to make a choice: to fly or to get married (Dad refused to be a widower soon).
- Věra made a choice: she got married.
- I (David) am the result.

From End of War to the Communist Coup

- More scary than aerobatics was the communist take-over of a democratic country.
- Few remember the coup d'état of 1948 and the militia taking over.
- In Věra's words: The communists were worse than Hitler.

1948–1968 20 Years under Communism

- Věra married Dr. Vladimír Tománek in 1950 and moved to the beautitul capital Prague.
- To here!
- Tough luck: Getting married in a Catholic church cost her a job. Forever!
- The only son David (I) was born in 1954.
- Tough luck: Being baptized within the hospital he was born in turned David into a black sheep at school.







1948–1968 More Problems under Communism (1)

Problem 1:

- Vera's husband Vladimír was the son of a well-known Medicine Professor, Dr. Ferdinand Tománek. He had his own clinic and had to be eliminated.
- As student of Mme. Curie, Ferdinand established *Radiotherapy as cure for cancer* in 1920. Many were jealous of him. *His life was terminated* soon after the 1948 communist take-over.
- Husband Vladimír became a well-known Chemical Engineer. He designed experiments. He held a temporary job from 1948-1968, always prepared to be fired when a suitable substitute would be found (none was ever found ...)
- The communist incentive for innovation was
 - if Vladimír succeeds, he can live
 - o if not, he will receive a 20-year prison sentence for "sabotage".
- The house Vera lived in was under Secret Police observation. Two men in black stationed across the street. Especially visible when foreign scientists visited.
- Can you imagine the fear of the Secret Police ringing the door bell at 2:00 am and taking Vera's husband and David's Dad away, forever?

More Problems under Communism (2)

Problem 2:

Věra and Vladimír (and me, David) believe in God. We are Catholic. We go to Church to praise God. You get banned from Society for that!

Problem 3:

- David (I) was a problem:
 - O As the black sheep, he was banned from eating with other kids. So ... he refused to eat. He was about to die of under-nourishment (in the words of the School Doctor).
 - O He was also banned from higher education (High School, University)
 - (High School, University)



These problems were about to put Věra into a madhouse.





- David graduated from the University in 1979 and left for Germany and the USA.

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
Life in Rheinfelden, Switzerland (2)
